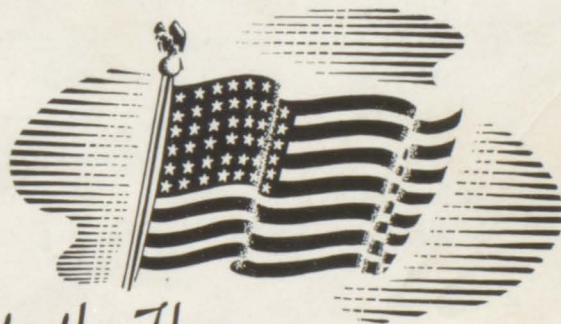

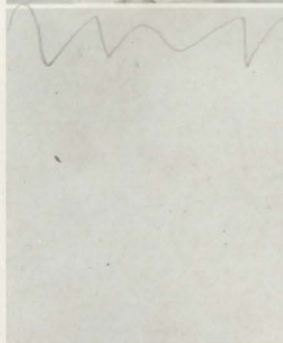

CLASS HISTORY

This climax to the social life of our school was attended by more than two hundred people. The "Rhythm Aires," an out-of-town orchestra, furnished the music for the evening's dancing.

During this year, some of us began making excuses, saying, "I am dull, and I love not to study; I pray thee excuse me." Late spring found us eighty-nine in number.

III

Now this, the senior year of the history of the history of our class of eighty and seven, has been one of much labor, and very little resting by the wayside, for preparations have been made ready for us to make our final departure from this Land of Learning.

To guide us this year, we chose Mr. George A. Queen and Mrs. Lutie D. Nickel, who resigned and was replaced by Mrs. Helen Baker. For officers we elected J. J. Gilmore, president; Jim Ed Hawkins, vice-president; Martha Jane Cook, secretary; and Muriel Meade, treasurer.
